The vital role of pipeline systems

The U.S. has over 2.5 million miles of pipelines that safely transport energy products, some of which include oil, natural gas, CO₂, jet fuel, and diesel. These products comprise our nation's energy infrastructure and are critical for commercial and industrial uses, consumer goods, and manufacturing. Pipelines are the safest, most efficient, and most reliable method to transport these resources².



Around-the-Clock Monitoring

Following proven safety principles and government guidelines, our team of experienced energy operators and control room personnel use high-tech sensors to monitor the performance of this pipeline 24 hours a day — seven days a week.



Pipeline Markers

Underground pipelines are not highly visible. Pipeline markers will help you identify the easement (a right-of-way or transportation corridor). When you see a pipeline marker, it should alert you that a pipeline is nearby.

Essential facts about pipeline markers:

- Placed along the right-of-way, near roads, railroad crossings, waterways, and at all above-ground facilities.
- Pipeline markers help you identify the location of a pipeline's right-of-way, not of the pipeline itself.
- Each marker provides Tallgrass' contact details, what's transported inside the pipeline, and the National One-Call Center.
- Markers indicate the general location of a pipeline, not the exact position, which is why companies must be called to locate utilities before any work occurs in the area.
- Pipeline markers don't tell you how many pipelines are buried in the area.
- Pipeline markers will not tell you how deep the pipeline(s) are buried.
- Between two markers, pipelines may not follow a straight path.
- Removing (or moving) pipeline markers is a federal offense. You should never rely on their presence; always call 811 to have underground utilities flagged before working in the area.

National One Call

Call Before You Dig is an essential safety program designed to prevent utility strikes, which can lead to serious injuries, costly repairs, and service interruptions. 811 is a free resource for anyone planning work, including leveling the ground, landscaping, planting trees, installing a fence, shed, or even a playground.

How to use 811

A few business days before beginning the work, call 811. Member companies will be notified and come to the property to mark the locations of their underground utilities. Please remember that privately owned facilities are not notified by 811 but may be present. When work begins, you should proceed cautiously; if you accidentally contact a pipeline, turn off any equipment, abandon the equipment, and leave the area on foot, heading upwind or uphill. Once you're a safe distance away, contact us immediately.

Remember, 811 is required by law. You could face significant fines if you don't call 811 in advance.



Safety First: Training and equipping local first responder teams

Safety First

Tallgrass' safety systems and processes foster a zero-incident culture.

Our advanced emergency shutdown systems are designed to safely and quickly isolate any anomalies; this ensures that the product transported through a pipeline stays inside the pipe, preventing leaks or spills by maintaining the pipeline's integrity.

Locally, we continue to work with first responders to identify needs, underwrite the cost of training for CO2 infrastructure programs and emergency response tactics, and offset the cost of equipment if needed.



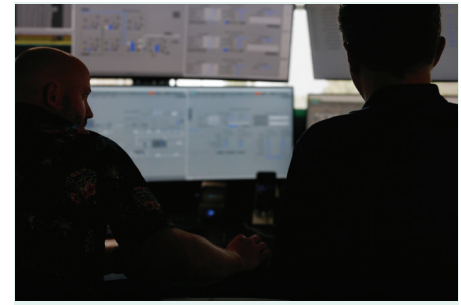
Asset Integrity: Ensures pipelines and facilities are safe and securely operated

Pipeline Integrity Management

This program ensures that pipelines and facilities are routinely inspected and improved — instituting preventive safety measures across all our assets and facilities ensures safe operations.

Damage Prevention Program

As an additional layer of safety, our Damage Prevention Program ensures we're following state and federal guidelines. It helps to prevent damage to the infrastructure and facilities from excavation and other activities.



Emergency Response: We prioritize safety and preparedness

Preparedness and Response

Our operations control center is staffed around the clock with trained professionals who promptly take the steps needed to isolate the affected pipeline segment (stopping the flow of product), implement our emergency response plan, and dispatch local teams to evaluate any damage. After ensuring the area is safe and secure, we work with landowners to address the issues.

Within this process, we will notify state, local, or federal regulatory agencies as needed; through close collaboration, we'll investigate the root cause, identify lessons learned, and take action to prevent a recurrence.

How to Recognize a Pipeline Leak



CO₂ is an asphyxiant meaning it is heavier than air and seeks low-lying areas such as valleys and ditches. In large amounts, CO₂ makes it difficult to breathe and could be harmful if inhaled.



A patch of dead or discolored vegetation in an otherwise green setting along a pipeline route.



A hissing or roaring sound.



Continuous bubbling in wet, flooded areas or in wetlands, rivers or creeks.



A slightly musty odor.



A white vapor stream or mist like cloud over the pipeline.



Unexpected frost or ice on the ground.

In An Emergency

DO

- ✓ Turn off equipment or motorized vehicles and abandon them by leaving the area immediately on foot; always walk in an upwind direction.
- ✓ Stay in a safe location upwind and uphill of the release; call 911.
- ✓ Warn others and direct people to leave the area.
- ✓ Call the Tallgrass emergency assistance number: (866) 295-4841.

DO NOT

- ✗ Make contact with leaking or escaping liquids or gases.
- ✗ Attempt to operate any pipeline valves.
- ✗ Try to extinguish any pipeline leak.
- ✗ Drive into a leak or vapor cloud area while leaving the area.
